Year 2:

Individuals, firms, markets and market failure

This part of the specification focuses on an advanced study of microeconomics by looking at costs of production, revenue curves, market structures, labour markets, wage determination, the distribution of income and wealth and government intervention.

The national and international economy

This builds on Year 1 knowledge of macroeconomic policies and objectives by looking at the national and international context and assessing macroeconomics performance by investigating key indicators, as well as examining financial markets and monetary policy.
