#### **Bletchley Park Workshop**

Our school had a very special visitor in April, from Bletchley Park, the famous British codebreaking centre from World War II. The visitor hosted a series of workshops for our students, and it was a fantastic learning opportunity for all who attended.

A total of 90 students had the privilege to participate in the workshops throughout the day. For our year 8 students, the focus was on the importance of personal cybersecurity and securing our devices from hackers. The session was very interactive and hands-on, allowing students to learn through experimentation.

During the workshop, students were able to test how quickly a computer could crack their passwords and how vulnerable their personal information is on social media. The workshop helped students to understand the importance of creating strong and unique passwords and the risks associated with sharing personal information online.

Additionally, 60 of our year 10 Computer Science students also had the opportunity to learn about encryption and how it works to prevent hackers from accessing our data. The workshop included an engaging activity that taught students about private keys and how they are used in encryption.

Students learned about how WhatsApp uses end-to-end encryption to keep our messages private and secure. This was an excellent opportunity for students to learn about how encryption technology can be applied in real-world situations.

Overall, the workshop provided our students with an excellent opportunity to deepen their understanding of cybersecurity and encryption. We would like to thank the Bletchley Park team for sharing their expertise and knowledge with our students.

#### **Didsbury Arts Festival**

During the first week of July we had visits from a range of writers as part of our connection with Didsbury Arts Festival. First up was Lindy Newns who ran a brilliant session with some of our Year 7 students focusing on self-worth and confidence. David Gaffney, author of a number of novels and celebrated writer of flash fiction, visited to hold a workshop with our Year 12 English Language students. During the session students explored the different ways writers can create and manipulate meaning in just a few words, before having a go at creating some flash fiction of their own focusing on the theme of Artificial Intelligence. It was great to see the students showcasing their creative skills, with some incredibly dystopian visions of a future controlled by AI. Finally, world-renowned poet Mike Garry visited school for a day to work with a number of students across Key Stage 4 and Key Stage 5. Having recently been commissioned to write the poem for the opening sequence of the BBCs FA Cup Final coverage, Mike spoke to students about his own upbringing in a working class family in Manchester, giving them the inspirational message that no matter your background you can go on to achieve your dreams. During the workshop, Mike performed a number of his own poems for the students, before getting them to develop their own writing to showcase their own voices, views and opinions.



It was amazing to see such a wide range of students engaging with all three writers, and a fantastic opportunity for the Parrs Wood community to be part of the wider Arts Festival.

#### **Iceland Trip**

On the 27th March, the Geography department took 49 Y10 students to Iceland for 4 days. This gave the students an opportunity to see first-hand tectonic activity in the form of exploding geysers, lava tunnels and the rift valley caused by the spreading of the North American and Eurasian tectonic plates. On day 1 we visited Reykjanes Peninsula where we went to the bridge between the 2 continents, walked through hot springs spewing out steam, watched the mud puddles bubble, and visited the new lava flow from 2022 which was still steaming, rounding up the day by walking through a lava tunnel! Needless to say, students and staff were looking forward to getting to the hotel for tea and a sit down.

Day 2 saw another action-packed day as we visited the Golden Circle. Here we went to Thingvellir National park and saw the rift valley where the North American plate and the Eurasian plate are splitting apart, whilst also visiting the spectacular Gullfoss waterfall. In the afternoon, we visited one of Iceland's well known geysers, Strokkur, which erupts every 8-10 minutes and it didn't disappoint. We headed to Laugarvatn to do a spot of bread making the students buried bread in the bubbling hot sand on the shores of the lake and then dug up already cooked bread which was served with freshly made butter and smoked salmon! Delicious! I even won some street cred when they realised I'd booked us into the same place Zac Efron had visited and he'd made bread there too! We finished up the day with a walk around Reykjavik.

Our final day took a different direction from planned due to bad weather and the police shutting the roads. We managed a visit to the interactive Lava centre demonstrating to the students the importance of Iceland's location with the separating tectonic plates, and linked this to the geothermal energy that makes Iceland a great advocate of green energy as we visited one of Iceland's largest Geothermal energy plants, where the heat from within the earth generates electricity to power homes and businesses and hot water systems. An impromptu visit to a frozen crater lake and ice cream farm (yes, it's never too cold for ice cream!) concluded our final day.

Staff and students both had a fantastic time, completely in awe of the power of our planet. We made lots of once in a lifetime memories.

The students behaved so well throughout the trip and were a credit to the school and their parents.

#### **STEAM Club**

STEAM Club this year had been attended by a group of year 7, 8 and 9 students. It was a great way for the students to have fun, be creative and expand their subject knowledge. It also helped to develop students' practical, teamwork, confidence, and problem-solving skills. The club consisted of many activities such as:

### **Social Science**

#### **Gang Prevention Programme**

We were extremely excited to host James Riley, a former probation officer with a specialism in urban street crime, delivering his Gang prevention programme to some of our Year 8 students. His use of stories and real life examples of gang recruitment, exploitation, consequences and how to get out, had students gripped in each of the 3 sessions. Students said they learned 'the importance of telling others when they are worried something serious is happening' they thought it was 'sick the way he told us stories to make us understand' and 'changed the way I think about gangs'.



#### **Male Identity Workshop**

Back in April the Social Science department, hosted a workshop for a pilot project around 'Male Identity & Healthy Relationships' with a small group of Year 9 students. With the aim of celebrating maleness and masculinity and to empower our young people to be ambassadors who feel equipped to challenge prejudice and discrimination towards women. The facilitators commented on the confidence and engagement of our young people and felt they could take away so much from their experience to be used to inform the development of the workshop for other schools. The students really enjoyed the interactive nature of the sessions and a safe space to explore some of the comments of adult influencers. Student expressed 'I learnt a lot from the scenario, where we could guide the characters as to what they could do differently and rewrite the plot on a different way and it made me think I could act differently too', they also said 'We learnt that you can't mind read what people are thinking and just to be more open minded in general' finally ' I really enjoyed the debates and how we could discuss things that I would be too scared to say to other people'. All in all a very successful workshop to contribute to the personal development of some of our Year 9s.

#### **Religious Studies**

On Thursday 6th July we held a Spiritual Awareness day which allowed our year 12 pupils the opportunity to meet various members of the Manchester community from a variety of faith backgrounds. Pupils felt like we benefited hugely from meeting and listening to these dedicated individuals who were able to explain the main tenets of their faith in a practical lived way.

Pupils have spoken positively about what they learn and how they have reflected. We are grateful to our representatives who were able to give up your time. We felt that this was a valuable day and that it had, indeed, raised their spiritual awareness.

#### **GCSE Citizenship**

24 pupils who study GCSE Citizenship took part in a mock trial at Manchester Metropolitan University. Each pupil played a role in the court, including the judge, the barristers, solicitors and the jury. Each witness was questioned by the lawyers using questions that the pupils had thought of themselves with the help of law students from MMU. The pupils got to wear wigs and gowns when they acted out their part. It was a really useful way to see how we ensure that defendants get a fair trial and how juries are influenced in the decisions they make.

### **Social Science**

#### Year 10 Citizenship to Parliament

On June 30th twenty pupils who study GCSE Citizenship went to London to have a tour of parliament. We started our visit in Trafalgar Square and walked past the guards at Horse Guards Parade, stopped at Downing Street to look at the Prime Minister's house, and heard Big Ben chime the hour. Once in parliament we had a private tour with a specialist guide where we learned about how parliament works and had the opportunity to watch the House of Lords in action. The group stood (you're not allowed to sit) in the House of Commons and saw where the Prime Minister, Leader of the Opposition and Speaker sit.

After the tour the group took part in a debate in a mock House of Commons. Each side had to think of arguments for or against the proposal to make public transport free for all people under 18. The law was passed after a lively debate.

We also visited Westminster Abbey where we saw the Coronation Chair recently used in the coronation of Charles III, as well as the tombs of Issac Newton, Charles Dickens and Elizabeth I.

The whole day was a great success and helped the pupils to understand how parliament works and how laws are passed. The group also got an understanding of the links between parliament, monarchy and religion in the UK. We even managed to get on and off the Northern Line without incident.



#### **Chester Zoo**

Psychology took a group of 50 year 10 students to Chester Zoo at the beginning of July. Students were able to get a taste for the topic they will be learning about next year, regarding animal communication and evolution. Students were able to see lots of different animals and then had a talk from a zoo keeper about how different species of animals have evolved over time to aid the survival of their species, as well as the different ways and reasons animals communicate with each other. The students also were able to create new animals which would be able to survive in a specific type of habit they were provided with (e.g., the desert, mountain range, rainforest) the students had a lovely day despite the rain for most of the day, and some even got their faces painted!

#### **Inspiring Women's Conference**

In May, a group of female Y10 students attended the 'Inspiring Women's Conference' at the Alliance Manchester Business School, which is part of the University of Manchester.

The girls listened to inspiring stories from women who had overcome adversity and were encouraged to challenge stereotypes in order to fulfil their own potential.

Students attended workshops where they were given advice and guidance about how to keep themselves mentally and emotionally healthy as well as top tips about completing applications and interview preparation ahead of starting their college applications next year.

Students were confident, passionate, and articulate, and a credit to our Parrs Wood community.


We are really looking forward to them all starting with us in September.
