We began the term with the first rehearsals of our school production for this year, High School Musical. We have been to two concerts at the Bridgewater Hall in Manchester by the Halle Orchestra. The first in January was a selection of the GCSE and A Level Music set works, and the second was the Halle Green Planet concert, celebrating music from around the world and outer space. Both were fabulous opportunities for our Parrs Wood students to experience a very wide range of orchestral music, performed by a world-class ensemble we are lucky to have on our doorsteps.


