# YEAR 12 GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK

Year 12 Geographers enjoyed an intensive week of fieldwork skills in February when they took part in a residential course at the Rhyd-y-Creuau, FSC field centre in Snowdonia. When they arrived they donned waterproofs and wellies to launch straight into an investigation measuring the carbon capture potential of a nearby woodland. They learned how to measure beach profiles, pebble roundness and how to evaluate the effectiveness of coastal defence schemes at Criccieth. A day at Llandudno enabled the group to use a range of qualitative data collection methods to assess the changes in the quality of life across the town. The students were also taught how to use statistical tests to check the validity of their results. They are now using these skills to complete their own independent NEA (coursework). One of our students, Isra Mubasher is also an amazing artist and captured our field day at Criccieth perfectly! Well done all!

# **CAREERS WORKSHOP BY THE EY FOUNDATION**

Year 10 Business students took part in a careers workshop hosted by the EY Foundation. EY Foundation is an independent charity dedicated to giving young people from all backgrounds a great start to their working lives. Held at the prestigious EY Head Office in Manchester City Centre, students spent the morning learning about how to be successful in the job application process and learn about a variety of future career pathways.

Sarah Batty (Programme Lead) delivered a workshop on preparing a CV and gave the students much to think about in terms of structure, the do's and don'ts of preparing a CV and some career advice.

The visit ended with a speed career networking event with several EY employees from departments including IT, risk

management and auditing sharing their career journeys with groups of students and engaging in Q & A about their job roles.



# ALL THINGS MUSIC

Our extensive range of enrichment and extra-curricular activities continued last term, with everything from DJ club, to choir, from ukulele club to steel pan lessons. We have record numbers of students attending these, and we're so glad that so many members of our Parrs Wood community take part in them in their own time.

We started the term in Music with a trip for choir and musical theatre club to Levenshulme High School to see their production of Frozen. It was wonderful to see other musicians, dancers and actors across our Trust doing what we love too!

Our Y11 Music Tech students spent the day at Salford University using their studios to record mock versions of their radio plays, used for their unit WHAT assessment. It was brilliant for the students to be able to experience their fantastic facilities and experience where their studies can take them.

Music and Music Tech students at KS4 and 5 went to the Beatles Story in Liverpool to learn about the development of their influences in the recording industry, and the history and culture of British music. They also got to examine the influences from Indian music on their output, which helps their understanding in their Fusions Area of Study at GCSE and A Level Music.

50 of our year 8 and 9 instrumentalists went to see the Hallé orchestra perform their Cities of the World concert at the



Bridgewater Hall in Manchester. The concert celebrated music from around the world, and based on different places around the world, and it was a wonderful opportunity for our students to see where their hard work, creativity and practice will take them. We will always help and encourage our students to

development of British music since WW2. They took part in a pop culture workshop in the morning and spent the afternoon going round the interactive exhibition, and finished in the Gibson guitar workshop. A great day out to enrich their curriculum!

We finished the term with 50 of our year 9-11 students seeing the production of Sister Act at the Palace Theatre on Oxford Road. It is so important for our students to see not only how hard work and practice can pay off in a professional career in music, but also how much fun it can be! Students on the GCSE and A Level courses study vocal music and music for stage and screen as part of their listening and appraising exam, and we will always find ways to bring the curriculum to life.



# A VISIT FROM A UNIVERSITY OF MANCHESTER STUDENT

Last term, the Computing Faculty at Parrs Wood have had the privilege of hosting a third-year computer science student from the University of Manchester. Leading an engaging extracurricular club as part of his university project, focused on Java programming for KS4 and KS5 students. This included teaching the students some advanced programming concepts around object oriented programming.

Introducing Java as a secondary programming language has significantly broadened students' skill sets to align with industry demands and technological trends.

Secondly he has been working with the year 13 students to help them prepare for computer science at university and building their programming skills which has supported them with the practical programming projects.

# **GARDENING THERAPY GROUP**



Since September, I have been running a Gardening Therapy Group at the Parrs Wood Environment Centre with Kit Walker. It is the continuation of an Intervention Group previously run by Kit and Mrs Fletcher. We take 5 or 6 pupils from Year 7 for a two-hour session each week. The children access the wonderful rural surroundings, and we cover different aspects of wildlife, teach them how to grow their own fruit and vegetables and help them understand how to care for plants. Besides being a great opportunity to learn about a healthy lifestyle (i.e. exercise, diet and teamwork) the time the pupils spend together helps to build friendships. They are provided with a safe place to talk and encourage positive Mental Health and wellbeing. Furthermore, it helps develop their speech, language and communication needs. Through the patience, kindness and enthusiasm delivered by Kit, the children learn how to form and sustain positive relationships not just with their peers, but adults as well. There is definitely a great sense that we all work together as a team. After a specified period of time the pupils receive Certification from the John Muir Award Institution. They also reap the rewards of harvesting what they have grown over the seasons. I have seen bags of carrots and onions, beans and tomatoes and flowers and more all collected and taken home by the children. I am extremely pleased to be part of this group. I enjoy being in the delightful grounds that the 'Friends of Parrs Wood' nurture and maintain. It is a good link between themselves and the school. I love the peacefulness of the gardens, the lush trees and full orchards that appear. I know that the children really appreciate it all as well. I also love to tell people that I am part of a team that can cultivate pineapples, even in Manchester!

Rachel a regulatory lawyer explained about her working life and the importance of work experience and volunteering as part of a professional job application.

# FUTURE CHOICES DAY

The Sixth-Form, experienced Future Choice Day, a one-shop stop to gather information on their Future Choices. There were talks from universities, apprenticeship providers and employers plus a visit to The Discovery fair in Manchester. Everybody took something different from the day – some got the most from learning about university life from current university students, others were inspired by the career journeys of the ladies from Ipsos, while others filled the gaps in their knowledge about their future career paths. The visit to the Discovery Fair in Manchester was universally informative and enjoyable by students, giving them the opportunity to ask questions of their chosen universities and meet apprenticeship providers.

There were also more apprenticeship inputs for Year 11 and 6th form from theapprenticeacademy who specialise in accountancy and finance, data analysis and business apprenticeships amongst other jobs with training, while our careers advisors were working with Year 11 and Year 12 through one to one careers appointments.











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
