






The MMU Degree Show




ES ∜ Year 10 Take on Spain! ∜ ES

A Slice of the Tropics in Greater Manchester

As part of our Outdoor Skills programme, Kit Walker, our longstanding volunteer at the Environment Centre, set us the task of pruning and harvesting some sugarcane. A large clump of *Saccharum officinarum* (striped sugarcane) had become overgrown and needed cutting back.

Using the right tools for the job, students sawed through the base of the stalks with a hand saw and cut the canes into smaller chunks using loppers. They then peeled away the tough outer skin to reveal the sweet inner core, a delicious sugary treat that can be chewed but not swallowed. Each student was allowed to take home a few pieces, which resembled sticks of seaside rock. Most pupils really enjoyed the sweet juice, with some saying it reminded them of times in Egypt, Iraq, and the Caribbean.

Originally from Asia, sugarcane is now grown in tropical and subtropical regions around the world, and even in greenhouses here in Greater Manchester. It dates back to prehistoric times and was famously described by the Ancient Greeks, who encountered it in India, as

"the reeds that produce honey without bees." In addition to being a natural sweetener, sugarcane is used in drinks, animal feed, and increasingly as a biofuel.

Sugarcane is just one of the more unusual plants grown at the Environment Centre here at Parrs Wood. In our greenhouses, you will also find giant agave, hibiscus flowers, peace lilies, and one slowly ripening pineapple, which we are all keeping a very close eye on.

River Bollin Field Trip

The Year 10 Geographers had a wonderful time on the 2025 physical geography field trip. There were several groups, each going on different days from the 2nd to the 4th of June. The groups went to a rural location on the River Bollin in the Peak District National Park, a picturesque part of the world. The principal focus of this trip was to collect river data e.g. river width, velocity, depth and bedload size and compare it to the Bradshaw Model.

We learnt how to collect this data using field work equipment such as ranging poles and calipers whilst also mastering the ability to look stylish in our wellingtons and waterproofs. Lunch would have been idyllic if it wasn't for the interesting smells produced by the local farm yard!

Overall this trip was a great experience for the students while also providing knowledge of how to collect primary river data which they will use in their future GCSE exams.

Year 10 GCSE Citizenship Moot Court at MMU



At the end of June, our students stepped into the shoes of judges, barristers, solicitors, ushers, clerks, and police officers during an unforgettable mock trial experience at Manchester Metropolitan University.

They explored:

- Types of law and how courts work
- The surprising fact that 95% of crimes are dealt with in magistrates' courts not crown court, busting myths from TV dramas!
- Why UK judges don't use gavels (despite what movies say!)
- The seriousness of giving an oath in court and the consequences of lying

The case revolved round a stabbing that took place during a fight between rival gangs. The jury had to decide if the accused had carried out the attack or could it have been someone else? Our young legal teams did a fantastic job fighting a fierce case, leading to a guilty verdict (10–2) and a tough sentence of 7 years 8 months announced by the Judge– perhaps reflecting real-world issues around rising youth knife crime.

The students said:

- "I never thought I'd want to go to university but I want to come to this one!"
- "I want to be a barrister now it was so fun and showed me what uni could be like!"

We wrapped up with a tour of MMU's inspiring campus – because ambition isn't limited to the courtroom!

There will be another opportunity for Year 10 Citizenship students to visit the court next year.

Our Year 12 students had an inspiring day at the 'Your Heart Hospital' experience, part of the British Cardiovascular Society's Annual Conference!

Where they explored:

- How the heart works

- Life-saving knowledge of CPR
- Careers in cardiology and healthcare

"I loved talking to the cardiac physiologist – now I know which career I want in healthcare!" Amira Year 12

We learnt 80% of cardiac arrests happen at home. The survival rate for a Coronary Arrest outside of hospital in Manchester is only 7% but starting CPR early and using a defibrillator could save 1000s of lives.


